GaDOE 2016 Federal Programs Conference

The Georgia Department of Education will host a two-day (June 22-23, 2016) conference at the Georgia International Convention Center (GICC) and the Atlanta Airport Marriot Gateway Hotel in College Park, Georgia. This year's conference is unique in that ALL federal programs will participate in the conference this year in a collaborative effort to provide our districts across the state with all the technical assistance information required for federal program implementation in one location. Over 170 sessions have been scheduled covering topics presented by program area specialists. The SCSC strongly encourages all state charter schools to send at least one representative at each segment of the conference. It is suggested that small districts/SCSCs that have one person in charge of several or all federal programs assign others to attend the conference to assist in gathering the important information provided that one person alone would not be able to obtain.

GaDOE Data Collections Conference

The target audience includes any individual with responsibility for collecting, maintaining, reporting, or certifying data at any levels within the school district.

2016 CCRPI Information

The first 2016 CCRPI application - the 2016 Post Data Collection for Innovative Practice and Personalized Climate - will open June 21 and close July 29, 2016. School leaders may have already begun preparing the post data to submit in the application. A user guide will be provided at the time the application opens; the GaDOE accountability team will host a webinar as well.

The next summer applications will be the Assessment Matching and Non-Participation Applications. The two applications will be open simultaneously this year and will function in a new way that should make work for state charter schools easier and more efficient. GaDOE plans to have two separate windows for the applications, with state charter school leader sign-off of specified assessments by the close of each window. State charter schools should continue to keep documentation on file that will support these applications. GaDOE will provide additional guidance and resources when the applications open, which GaDOE anticipates will be mid-to-late July.

You will receive information regarding the Summer Graduate and Cohort Withdrawal Update applications in late summer from GaDOE.

2016 CCRPI Georgia Alternate Assessment (GAA) Request to the 1% Cap

State charter school leaders are reminded that students' scores on the GAA are used for reporting under ESEA requirements that were not waived by US ED. Federal law places a cap on the percentage of scores based on an alternate assessment that may be included for accountability reports. The number of proficient and advanced scores of these students may not exceed 1% of all students in the grades tested (3-8, 11). Please be aware that with the passing of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), by 2017-2018 this 1% cap will apply to the number of GAA participants, as opposed to the number of proficient and advanced.

Assessment Directors should complete and submit the GAA survey regarding students who participate in the alternate assessment. As part of that survey, state charter schools can request the exception to the 1% cap. **The survey must be completed and submitted no later than July 1, 2016.**

The survey is now accessible in the secure MyGaDOE portal for Assessment Directors. All state charter schools must complete questions 2 and 3 of the survey even if the district is not requesting an exception. To answer question 3, ALL state charter schools must provide on system letterhead the names of staff trained to administer the GAA, as well as the 2015-2016 dates of training. If the state charter school has determined that it has exceeded the 1% cap and is requesting the exception, the remainder of the survey must be completed as well.

The <u>GAA Worksheet</u> can be used 1) for determining if an exception is necessary and 2) in preparation for Question # 4 if requesting an exception. You can either complete the attachment and upload it in the survey OR access and complete the electronic worksheet via the hyperlink in Question #4 of the GAA survey. Instructions for completing the worksheet can be found in <u>GAA Survey Instructions</u>. The worksheet will automatically calculate the percentage of GAA participants

that exceed the 1% cap in grades 3-8 and 11. The kindergarten and 1st and 2nd grade numbers are <u>not</u> part of the calculation and are for comparison purposes only.

The Special Education Director should support the Assessment Director in gathering and compiling the data. The Assessment Director must submit the electronic version of the survey by selecting the button labeled "submit". Once the Assessment Director has submitted the survey, the state charter school leader must be alerted that the survey is ready for sign off. The state charter school leader must sign off on the completed survey by selecting the "approval" button. This final step ensures GaDOE's receipt of the district's survey. Instructions for accessing the survey are included in the *GAA Survey Instructions* document.

Governance Training

Deadline - June 30, 2016

Georgia law, O.C.G.A. § 20-2-2084(f), requires every member of a governing board of a state charter school to participate in annual governing board training. For FY16, state charter school governing board members had the opportunity to participate in SCSC-provided training at no cost, or to seek alternate training using their own funds. As the opportunity to participate in SCSC provided governance training has now expired, state charter board members must fulfill the obligation through the following method.

State charter school governing board members <u>may use their own funds</u> to contract for a minimum of 12 contact
hours of training from a provider that is approved by the State Board of Education to deliver governance training
to charter schools. Training content must reflect the topics covered at the SCSC Governance Training. Review the
SCSC Guidance on Governance Training for a complete list of requirements and to ensure compliance.

All schools are required to implement the Teacher and Leader Keys Effectiveness Systems to evaluate school administrators and teachers (TKES and LKES). To conduct the evaluations, representatives from the school must receive training and credentialing. The SCSC has worked with the GaDOE to schedule an initial training and credentialing session for new state charter schools and newly hired staff at existing state charter schools this summer.

State charters should send the individuals from their schools who will be charged with conducting TKES/LKES evaluations to this training. The SCSC recommends that at least two individuals become credentialed to conduct TKES evaluations (evaluations of teachers) and that two individuals become credentialed to conduct LKES evaluations (evaluations of school leaders). Generally, school administrators are charged with conducting TKES evaluations, and the principal and a board member are charged with conducting LKES evaluations. Georgia's Charter School Incubator Seeks Qualified Applicants for Cohort Two

New Schools for Georgia's Charter School Incubator, is seeking applications from mission-driven teams to develop and expand rigorous, innovative, and high-quality school options in Georgia.

Through the Incubator, New Schools for Georgia works with five new or replicating charter school teams each year to provide highly-focused, personally-tailored training and support for school leaders and governing boards. New Schools for Georgia works with school founding teams in three distinct phases: Incubation, Year Zero Support, and Ongoing Support.

Teams may prepare to open schools anywhere in the state, but priority is given to those planning to serve families in areas of high need—especially in Atlanta Public Schools (APS). Additional grant funds of up to \$350,000 per applicant for start-up costs is available to those intending to open charter schools that would serve APS students. The Incubator program includes a year-long, paid fellowship for instructional leaders. The school-based fellowship includes: coaching, mentorship, residency opportunities and live instruction.

Successful Incubator team members will be:

- Mission-driven
- Strong communicators
- Strong collaborators
- Patient and committed (willing to serve for a minimum of three years)
- Strong believers in public service and social justice
- Able to attend all trainings during incubation period and monthly board meetings during Incubation Year, Year Zero and after school opening
- Free from ethical and legal conflicts
- Able to pass all legal requirements for working with children, serving on a nonprofit board and fiduciary responsibility for handling public funds
- Individuals with skills in the following areas: finance, legal, instruction, fundraising/grants, nonprofit operations, governance, community activism, policy, facilities, state/federal/local government and/or entrepreneurship

Applicant teams do not have to include an instructional leader, but one must be identified by January 2017 before the charter petition is submitted to the authorizer. Instructional leaders must be willing to commit to the full one-year paid fellowship starting in August of 2017.

The Georgia Department of Public Health (DPH) is seeking the input of state charter schools in the support of the Tobacco-Free School initiative. DPH would like to work with all state charter schools to adopt a 100% Tobacco Free Schools policy and eliminate tobacco from Georgia's elementary and secondary school campuses.

FY17 Innovation Fund Grant Opportunities Governor's Office of Student Achievement

AntiBullying Summit

Auburn University

Auburn University will host its sixth national AntiBullying Summit in Peachtree City, Georgia, on June 23-24. Bullying affects academic performance, school safety, student mental health (suicide, self harm, drug abuse), and school drop out rates/absenteeism.

The Summit has received endorsement from the Georgia Professional Standards Commission and has been approved for CEU and PLU credit. Approximately one-fourth of today's students report that they have been the victims of bullying, with the highest rate in the middle school grades. The issue, particularly cyberbullying, is of great concern to all schools and communities.

Keynote speakers will include Dr. Sameer Hinduja, co-director of the Cyberbullying Research Center; and Trish Prabhu, a teen-ager who developed ReThink, bullying intervention software. Other speakers include the <u>Honorable Steven Teske</u>, who serves on the judicial advisory council of the Georgia Department of Juvenile Justice, Marilyn Watson from the Georgia Department of Education who will speak on School Climate Star Rating, and <u>Darrell Green</u>, NFL Hall of Famer who has established a national Strong Youth, Strong Community Foundation that works with at-risk youth.
