Key questions can be addressed using these two unique measures. Are our remedial efforts working? Are we headed in the right direction? What is our weakest link? Where are our strengths? Which domains by Milestone should we focus on? Are we challenging our advanced students? How does information in SLDS help us dig deeper in CCRPI? Is there a way to compare scores over the years when the test and format continues to change? How are all the scores related?
